We have seen an increase in Residential Burglaries in the confines of the 112th Precinct.

Please follow some of the Crime Prevention Tips below to protect your Home

- Install Motion Sensor LED lighting around your Home.
- Be sure all windows and doors are locked before leaving your home.
- Keep shrubbery neatly trimmed and preferably to a maximum height of 5 feet
- Keep fences, gates and garage doors locked
- Secure your valuables in a safe or lock box
- When leaving for vacation DO NOT advertise your trip on Social Media and ask a trusted friend to look over your home while you're gone
- Invest in an alarm system and test it frequently
- Install Motion Detection Cameras around the Perimeter and Interior of your home if feasible
- Set up a FREE Security Survey with the 112 Precinct Crime Prevention at 718-520-9319



Apartment Burglary Alert



A message from the 112th Precinct

We have seen an increase in Residential Apartment Burglaries in the confines of the 112th Precinct.

Please follow some of the Crime Prevention Tips below to protect your Home

- Be sure to lock all Doors and Windows. This includes Patio Doors and Windows on upper floors.
- Invest in an FDNY approved Ferry Gate to secure your fire escape window.
- If you observe strangers “milling around” the apartment community or hallways call 911
- Get to know your neighbors and staff of the building. If you see someone “working” on an apartment you don’t recognize as staff, try calling the building office to confirm
- Secure your valuables in a safe or lock box
- When leaving for vacation DO NOT advertise your trip and notify apartment management you’re going to be away for an extended period of time.
- Invest in an alarm system and test it frequently
- Install Motion Detection Cameras around the Perimeter of your apartment
- If you are NOT expecting visitors, DO NOT buzz people into the building you do not know

AUTO THEFT PREVENTION TIP: Don't Leave the Keys in the Ignition

Vehicles left unattended with keys in the ignition are easily targeted by car thieves. This dangerous practice allows for an easy theft or a joy ride by an inexperienced driver.

This commonly occurs around the neighborhood store, deli, coffee shop, or newspaper stand. Remain alert. Don't create an opportunity. Don't become a victim!

When leaving your vehicle always:

- Close Your Windows
- Turn off the Ignition and **REMOVE THE KEYS**
- Lock Your Doors!

You might only be a "minute" --
but a minute is all a thief needs.
Lock up your car and take your keys with you!

NEVER LEAVE YOUR PERSONAL PROPERTY UNATTENDED

What Can I Do?



Purse

Carry your purse close to your body.
Never wrap the strap around your body.



Headsets

White headsets are a dead giveaway.
Protect your musical device by keeping it out of sight.



Wallets

Never Carry your wallet in the rear pants pocket which is one of the easiest to pick.



Car Items

Place items out of sight in the trunk of your vehicle prior to reaching your destination. Never leave packages in the vehicle.



Distractions

Be wary of distractions. Sometimes one perp diverts your attention while another picks your pocket or steals your belongings.



Laptops

Don't leave laptop computers unattended -- even for a minute.



Instincts

Follow your instincts. Remember, "if it seems too good to be true, it probably is."



Report It.

Immediately report a theft or suspicious activity to the NYPD by calling 911.



Cell Phones

Hold on to your cell phone and keep it secured out of sight when not in use.



Cash & Cards

Carry only the amount of cash or number of credit cards necessary to make your purchases for the day.



Handbags

When in a bar or restaurant, don't leave your handbag over the back of your chair, on a stool or on the floor.
